Weather and Nature — Seasons and Landscapes

Talking about weather and nature in English is useful for daily conversations, travel, and outdoor activities. People often describe the seasons, climate, and different landscapes. Weather affects plans, clothing, and activities, so knowing the vocabulary is important.

There are four main seasons: spring, summer, autumn (fall), and winter. Spring is warm, flowers bloom, and days get longer. Summer is hot, sunny, and people often go to the beach or have outdoor activities. Autumn is cooler, leaves change color, and it can be windy or rainy. Winter is cold, sometimes snowy, and people wear warm clothes.

Weather conditions include sunny, cloudy, rainy, windy, stormy, snowy, and foggy. People often ask: “What’s the weather like today?” or “Is it going to rain?” Using adjectives correctly helps describe weather clearly.

Temperature words are also useful. Hot and warm describe high temperatures, while cool and cold describe low temperatures. Freezing describes very cold conditions, and mild

refers to comfortable temperatures.
