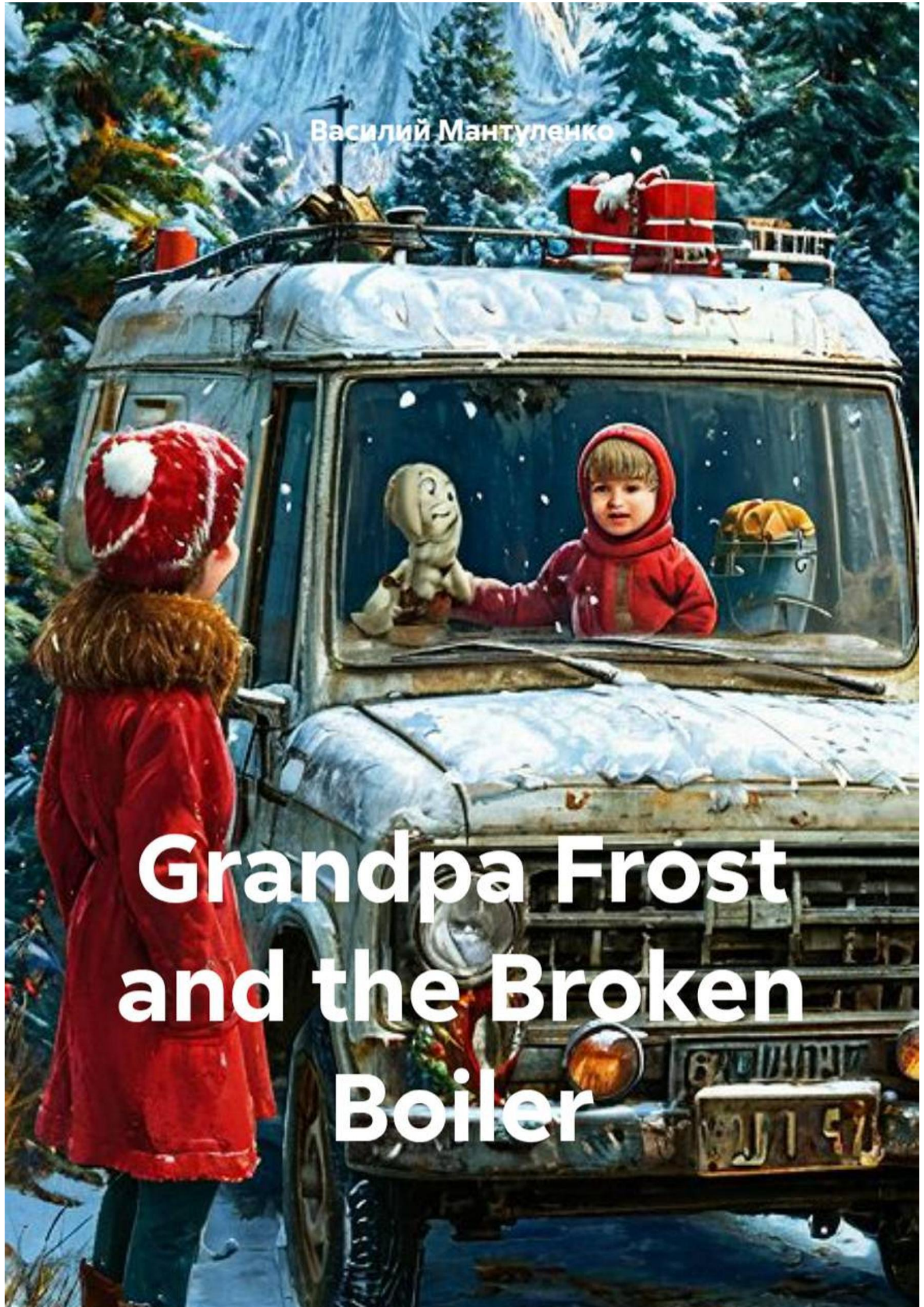

This story is written in simple, funny English for young learners at level A1–A2. It uses short sentences, everyday words, and plenty of dialogue and jokes, so children can read it aloud and enjoy it in the classroom or at home.

The story is a modern, humorous retelling of the classic Russian folk tale "Morozko" (Old Man Frost) — with a broken boiler instead of a broken heart, a phone-obsessed stepsister, and a Grandpa Frost who drives a very unreliable van.

Each of the 13 chapters ends with a short "New Words" box: key vocabulary from the chapter, with simple English definitions, to help build reading confidence and vocabulary step by step.

We hope this warm, funny story brings a smile — even on the coldest days!
